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Depression

In the late 1890s, a depression hit Covina. Part of the problem with the local economy was that some ranchers were slow to change from deciduous fruit and vegetables to citrus. Gradually economic conditions improved, and Covina became a center of the citrus industry. In 1909, the University of California and the Southern Pacific Railroad ran a special train to Covina filled with agriculture experts to give lectures and demonstrations to ranchers from all over the San Gabriel Valley. In 1902, William Bowring (Fred Coulter's - grandfather), called an organizational meeting of the Charter Oak Citrus Association, which in 20 years shipped 9,000 freightcars of oranges with more than 4 million boxes. Price of citrus acreage continued to increase. Groves that sold for \$250/acre in 1912 resold for \$1250/acre in 1914.
