MANZANITA SCHOOL

4131 N. Nora Avenue, Covina, California.
Site: located on ten acres on Nora Avenue at San Bernardino Road in county territory. The property was purchased from Mr. Henry J. Wackerbarth, for \$116,518, in April, 1960.

Serving students in grades kindergarten through six, the school was designed by Maul (former Covina Rotarian) and Pulver, and consists of sixteen regular classrooms, two kindergarten rooms, administrative unit, and multi-purpose building. The general contractor was William C. Crowell Co. for a total cost of \$511,165, or \$15.19/sq. ft. Total area 33,738 sq. ft.

The school was constructed with bond funds, and was completed in February, 1962. It was the first of the District's elementary schools to provide classrooms that were dividable, by the use of moveable walls, to accommodate "team teaching."

Thanks to the foresight and generosity of our voters. under the leadership of Rotarian Mike Miller using bond funds from Measure C, the school was remodeled and upgraded, including a library media center. David Mintz is the principal and we look forward to meeting him, the staff, and especially the students as we move our regular Covina Rotary meeting on May 1st to Manzanita School for our "Read to the Students" extravaganza.

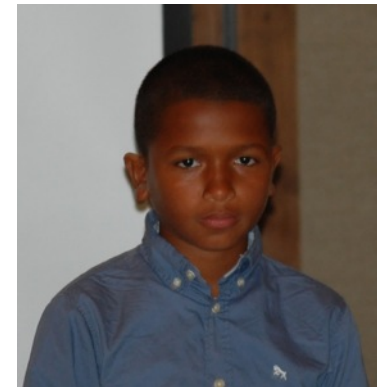
