VOCATIONAL SERVICE 101:

What first brought you to Rotary? In all likelihood, someone thought you might make a good member. Based upon your business or profession, they thought, "Hey, a new classification and they're a good person!"

Here's what you should know: Each Rotary Club's membership represents a cross-section of its community's business and professional population with as wide a cross-section of classifications as possible. Clubs try to reflect that diversity and promote integrity through ethical behavior. Basically, our 4-Way Test and the Rotary Code of Conduct are expected to be a central part of each Rotarian's daily road map.

The 4-Way test started in 1932 when Herbert Taylor of the Chicago Rotary Club was given the task of saving a company from bankruptcy. He quickly developed a 4-Way Test as an ethical guide for all business matters. The company's survival was credited to that simple but brilliant philosophy and Rotary International adopted Herbert's 4-Way Test in 1934 as a guiding light for Rotarians worldwide. Twenty years later, the Rotary Club in Chicago made Herbert Taylor their Club President.
